Beginning in October of 2013 many members of the TAA have lavished their time, efforts, and creative juices on what is shaping up to be a grand display of scouting history in the Denver area. The artifacts on display will tell the many stories of scouting in the Denver area and its city, plains, and high mountain camps through the years. Presentations of scouting memorabilia, plus numerous homemade articles and Scout created folk art pieces, add color and personal interest to the days gone by.

A preview of the room was held on February 24th for the Denver Area Council Board of Trustees and Directors after their Board meeting and Dedication of the Colorado Adventure Point Center. Hooked on Tahosa

Update & Supplemental Stocking of Tumblesom Lake

Many of you are aware of the Hooked on Tahosa Fly Fishing Merit Badge program that we Alumni sponsor annually for novice fly fishers. Catching a trout on a fly can be a daunting, yet very rewarding, experience for a young Scout. He must first locate the fish, determine what it is feeding on, select the proper fly imitation, and present the fly in a convincing manner to stimulate the fish into biting the fly. Along the way, he learns a number of life's virtues, i.e., good sportsmanship, problem solving, conservation, respect and appreciation for nature, and something particularly challenging for many young teens, patience. The course offers completion of all of the requirements of the merit badge with the possible exception of catching a fish on a fly. To this end, the merit badge is unique among most merit badges in that the ultimate, non-human merit badge counselor, "Mr. Trout", decides whether the Scout is worthy of completion of that requirement! It often boils down to one tenet: "the smarter one of the two wins the contest!"

This year's program will take place during the first two weeks in may. On one weekend, the program will be a camping/fishing experience for the entire weekend, and on the other, it will be a day-only event.

In other news, plans are being made to conduct supplemental stocking of the lake again this year. The 2010 winter drawdown for the dam repair adversely affected the fishery and the ecology

of the lake. This led to a cancellation of the Hooked on Tahosa fly-fishing program in 2011. A stocking of 8-inch rainbow trout was made in 2012. Fishing reports over the last few years indicate that the lake continues to recover steadily as might be expected in such a mountain lake with a short growing season. While catch and release has been encouraged, trout in lake Tumblesom are receiving heavy natural predation from otters, cormorants, and osprey; and additional fish are needed to replace them. Frank Lindsey has received commitments from a few donors towards the purchase of more fish. Additional contributions would be greatly appreciated. Please contact Frank if you wish to donate to the restocking project.
